

## **TRiO Hot Topic – Scholarships**

Scholarships are what we call "free money" because they don't have to be paid back! That's why it is wise to find and apply for as many scholarships as you can. There is no limit to how many you can apply for or receive, and there are literally thousands of scholarships out there!

Some scholarships are merit-based, which means you have to meet some type of requirement for eligibility like good grades, high SAT or ACT scores, athletic ability, or special talents, traits or interests. Other scholarships are based on financial need. Scholarships can cover the entire cost of tuition or be a one-time award of a few hundred dollars.

Students are encouraged to start researching scholarships during the summer between their junior and senior years. However, it's not a bad idea to start even sooner than that because there are some scholarships that require submissions a year prior to starting college.
